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

ADVOCACY AND DETERMINATION

West40 and our colleagues from the Illinois Coalition for Educating At-Risk Youth and the Illinois Association of Regional Superintendents of Schools secured a nearly \$13 M increase to the Regional Safe Schools Grant, of which West40's funding will increase by \$620,000. West40 continued to advocate for increased Evidence-Based Funding, and the legislature added another \$350 M to the funding formula for this coming school year. Our allocation of those new dollars will assist us in expanding alternative education services, developing and

maintaining a healthy reserve and to servicing debt incurred through the purchase and renovation of our new Safe School and office facility as well as the facility that will ultimately serve youth-in-care.

West40 staff also successfully advocated with the legislature for funding for the Mobile Museum of Tolerance and for passage of SB1924, which among other items, created more parity in the retirement benefit calculation between IMRF members retiring from ROEs and ISCs with their counterparts retiring from school districts.



A PLACE TO GROW

West40's Alternative Learning Opportunities Program (ALOP) offers a safety net for elementary, middle school and high school students at their home schools that provides social emotional learning support and a welcoming atmosphere. West40 student advocates help fill in the gaps that young learners need to thrive and the 2022-23 school year saw an increase in the number of students served and an improvement in school attendance.

MAKING STRIDES

With a goal of getting kids back on the path to graduation, the West40 Regional Safe School helps students take ownership of their trajectory in life using restorative practices and learning about how trauma can affect our brain. Now at our new location at the former Lexington Elementary in Maywood, our social workers, teachers, and interventionists focus on social-emotional and academic support while empowering students to recognize and use their strengths to meet their goals. The 2022-23 school year saw the beginning of new opportunities for our students, including work internships and a talent and art show.







EQUIPPING EDUCATORS WHEN TIME MATTERS

Teachers, school support services personnel, and administrators count on West40 to help them navigate the complex nature of education licensure and HR support. During the past year, our team of licensure experts addressed a significant increase in inquiries from new and seasoned school professionals as well as retired educators looking to get back into the classroom. The increase can be attributed to changes to state licensure policy, more awareness of the educator shortage, and more interest from prospective substitute teachers and paraprofessionals.



BACKPACK GIVEBACK

One of our goals is to help ensure kids can go to school with essential school supplies. With support from Morton College and local businesses, we distributed 3,200 stocked backpacks during last year's Backpack Giveback and the donation requests and opportunities that followed.

ASSISTING ASYLUM SEEKERS

West40 delivered winter coats, diapers, baby formula, flash drives, and backpacks to a donation event for asylum seekers coordinated by a partner school district. We also provided advocacy to schools to support the newly-arrived students.

SCOTY AWARDS SCHOOL CITIZEN OF THE YEAR

West40 honored 131 students who go above and beyond in the classroom. Area educators nominate SCOTY Award recipients for their positive attitude, willingness to help others, leadership skills, and work ethic.

PAINTED LADY BUTTERFLIES

It's an annual tradition 34 years and counting! West40 added fun and beauty to learning about natural sciences by providing 769 Painted Lady Butterfly culture kits and 359 mesh butterfly houses to classrooms and households throughout our partner districts.

COMMUNICATIONS SERVICES

West40 managed communications projects for four partner school districts during the 2022-23 school year, resulting in nine long-form video productions, a community report, a communications audit, and website support.

MANAGING FINANCIALS

As the fiscal agent for the Philip J. Rock Center & School in Glen Ellyn, West40 oversaw \$3.9 million in funds. Additionally, West40 processed \$41 million from the funds it oversees for 609 schools in the EANS (Emergency Assistance to Nonpublic Schools) progam.

financials

West40 revenue comes from grants and contracts from and with the State of Illinois along with local professional development fees and fees for testing services, background checks, and licensure. Our largest source of revenue comes from Evidence-Based Funding (EBF) for Alternative Learning Opportunities Programs and our Regional Safe Schools, the former continuing to grow in enrollment from year to year, which in turn brings more funding allowing us to serve even more students designated by our districts as being at-risk of not graduating. The increase in student population as well as a significant increase in local and state contracts has necessitated growth in our staff, and for FY24 we will employ more than 200 full-time certified and non-certified staff.

Because of the success our students have had in our alternative education programs, we were asked to collaborate with the Department of Children and Family Services (DCFS), the Department of Juvenile Justice (DOJJ), and the Department of Human Services (DHS) to build a residential program for at-risk youths as part of the Governor's mental health initiative. To house this program, West40 purchased the St. Joseph High School property in Westchester, IL. While the building, renovations, and program will be 100% funded by these State agencies, a \$9M debt certificate was issued in May 2023 for the purchase of the facility and to finalize renovations of our new Safe School and office space in Maywood.
